



Help Other People With Their Tax Returns

Did You Know

There's something YOU can do about taxes?

There's something very good you can do about taxes. You can help people in your community who need assistance with their tax returns. You'll get free IRS training, and there's on-the-spot satisfaction you receive again and again as a VITA volunteer using your knowledge to help other people.

You and Volunteer Income Tax Assistance

As a VITA volunteer, you'll help people who probably need tax help the most...those with a low to limited income, individuals with disabilities, non-English-speaking, and elderly taxpayers. And you'll be giving the help at convenient places, such as neighborhood community centers, libraries, churches, and shopping centers. A number of locations also offer electronic filing.

How can you help?

You have a number of choices. It depends on what you'd like to do, your skills and knowledge. In addition to being a tax assister you could serve as an instructor, a site coordinator or a publicity director.

What if you can use some training, or brushing up?

The training is yours. Instruction and materials are FREE. IRS employees or volunteers train you how to prepare Forms 1040EZ, 1040A and the basic 1040 and related schedules.

Volunteers also provide assistance and return preparation for prior year federal income tax returns, as well as, the earned income and advanced income tax credit.

New volunteers generally receive four-to-five days' instruction; experienced individuals, a one-to-two-day refresher. There's also self-instruction. A test on the material in the training guide shows whether you can do the job. Training is usually available December through January at a convenient location.

How else does the IRS back you up?

Technical assistance helps you ensure that taxpayers receive accurate assistance. A special toll-free Hotline answers your technical tax questions when you're helping taxpayers. The IRS

randomly reviews volunteer-prepared returns and provides immediate feedback to help you maintain quality service.

Upon request, accommodations for persons with disabilities will be provided by sponsoring organizations in cooperation with the IRS.

Look to the IRS for help in obtaining publicity and for information on running your VITA site. Your IRS Taxpayer Education Coordinator is available before, during, and after training to help you have a successful program.

How can you qualify?

You qualify if you...

- can meet and deal with a variety of people,
- have experience or can learn about preparing income taxes,
- have general administrative or publicity experience,
- take pride in complete and accurate work,
- are willing to complete the IRS training program and
- can spend several hours a week on VITA from January 1 through April 15.

How do you get involved in VITA?

To join VITA in your area, just call the Taxpayer Education Coordinator at the number listed on the back of this brochure, or mail the attached VITA Interest Card to the IRS office nearest you.
